A GROWING UNIVERSITY

Created by the Texas Legislature in 1969, The University of Texas at San Antonio has indeed come far since enrolling its first class of 670 graduate students in 1973. This year, UTSA enrolled more than 28,400 students in 131 undergraduate and graduate degree programs.

UTSA is meeting the region's growing demand for access and excellence in higher education through programs and services offered on its three campuses: the 1604 Campus, the Downtown Campus and UTSA's Institute of Texan Cultures.

The 1604 Campus encompasses two tracks totaling 725 acres amid one of San Antonio's fastest-growing economic corridors.

The Downtown Campus serves students on 18 acres in the historic heart of San Antonio.

UTSA's Institute of Texan Cultures, also located in downtown San Antonio, is San Antonio's cultural experience museum, one that develops exhibits, programs and special events dedicated to enhancing the understanding of cultural history and its influence upon the people of Texas.



Increasingly an institution of first choice, UTSA offers 64 bachelor's, 46 master's and 21 doctoral degree programs.

UTSA's Downtown Campus is home to the College of Architecture, the College of Public Policy, the UTSA Mexico Center, the Bank of America Child and Adolescent Policy Research Institute, and the Institute for Economic Development.

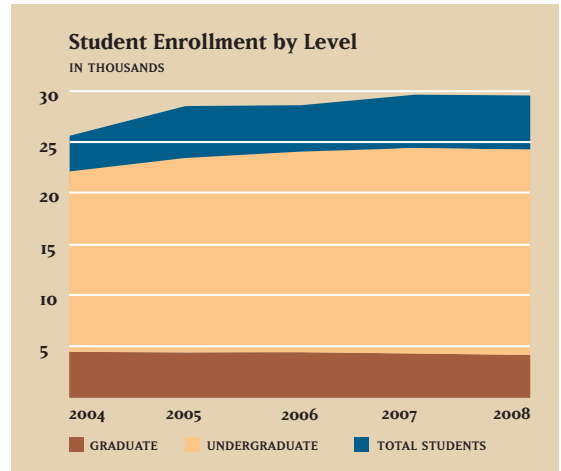


STUDENTS

UTSA enrolled 28,413 students in fall 2008. Its campuses are robust centers of learning, creativity, research and student life. In addition to serving students throughout Texas, UTSA educates students from 47 states and 72 foreign countries.

In the 2007–2008 academic year, UTSA awarded degrees to 4,591 students.

More than 3,550 students live on campus in four residential complexes.

UTSA is meeting the growing demand for on-campus housing with more than 3,550 students living in four residential complexes: University Oaks, Chisholm Hall, Chaparral Village and Laurel Village.

UTSA sponsors more than 240 student organizations that help foster leadership, service and social life on its campuses.



STUDENT DIVERSITY

UTSA provides access and opportunity for large numbers of historically underserved students. More than 57 percent of UTSA's students come from groups underrepresented in higher education. Many students are the first in their families to attend a college or university.

UTSA ranks No. 4 in the nation for the number of undergraduate degrees awarded to Hispanic students and No. 10 nationally in the number of master's degrees awarded to Hispanics, according to *Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education* magazine rankings.

The College of Business was named one of the top 10 M.B.A. programs for minorities by the 2007 *Princeton Review* and one of the top 10 graduate business schools in the nation by *Hispanic Business* magazine.

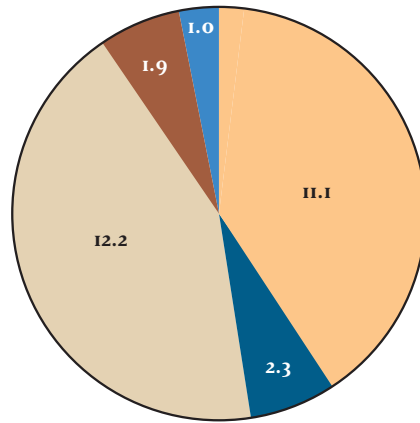

• In fall 2007, UTSA initiated the Undergraduate Tuition Support and Access (UTSAAccess) program for incoming freshman with family incomes of \$25,000 or less. Eligible students receive grants and scholarships to cover tuition and fees for four years as long as students take 30 hours a year and maintain at least a 2.0 grade point average.

ACADEMIC ORGANIZATION

By offering a comprehensive range of academic and preprofessional degrees, UTSA provides a learning environment to meet the needs and fuel the dreams of a diverse and growing student body.

UTSA offers 64 bachelor's degrees, 46 master's degrees and 21 doctoral degree programs.

- The College of Architecture is the second-largest college or school of architecture in Texas, and in the last seven years has been the fastest-growing architecture/interior design/construction management program in the nation.

- The College of Business is one of the 40 largest business schools in the nation and was nationally ranked by *BusinessWeek* as the No. 3 Flex M.B.A. program in the Southwest and the No. 26 Flex M.B.A. program nationwide.

- The College of Education and Human Development offers an interdisciplinary Ph.D. in culture, literacy and language, the only one of its kind in Texas.

- The College of Engineering's enrollment has doubled in size over the past seven years.

- The Honors College, with 737 undergraduates, has awarded 19 Archer Fellowships for students to study and intern in Washington, D.C., over the past four years.

- The College of Liberal and Fine Arts is UTSA's largest college and a major driver of the creative economy through its nationally recognized research, teaching and service in the arts, humanities and social sciences.



UTSA's College of Public Policy is home to the Institute for Demographic and Socioeconomic Research and the Texas state demographer, Karl Eschbach, at the Texas State Data Center.

The College of Sciences has led the nation in the number of undergraduate degrees awarded to Hispanics in the biological sciences for the past decade, according to 2007 *Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education* magazine rankings.



RESEARCH AND SPONSORED PROGRAMS

Academic research is no longer limited to the creation and dissemination of knowledge and the training of the next generation of researchers. Today's complex research problems require collaborations of interdisciplinary teams involving universities, health science centers, industry, the military, research institutions, governments and others.

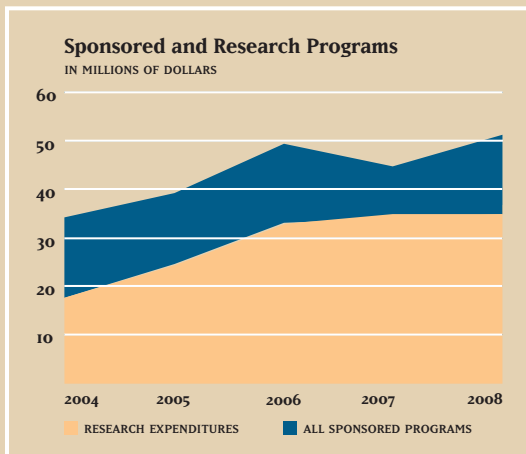
At UTSA, research expenditures have doubled over the past five years and include major collaborations with the UT Health Science Center at San Antonio, Southwest Research Institute, U.S. military and commercial partners.

In fiscal year 2008, UTSA research expenditures and sponsored program funding totaled more than \$51 million.

UTSA research is as diverse as its student body. Awards from federal, state and local agencies, as well as private foundations, support a wide range of basic and applied research projects, public service work and training programs.

The \$10.6 million Margaret Batts Tobin Laboratory Building accommodates faculty and graduate students researching emerging infectious diseases and includes UTSA's second biosafety level 3 laboratory.



UTSA'S ECONOMIC IMPACT

In addition to the educational advantages UTSA offers, the most recent economic impact study estimates that the university directly and indirectly produces \$852 million in annual business activity in Texas, including more than 6,500 jobs and \$200 million in personal income.

Purchases by UTSA in fiscal year 2007 totaled more than \$48.6 million with 35.4 percent designated or obtained from historically underutilized business (HUB) vendors. For the ninth consecutive year, UTSA ranked among the top 25 programs in Texas. Since 2000, UTSA has more than doubled the amount of purchases made with HUB vendors.

The university currently has 5,138 employees.

Many of UTSA's 76,000 alumni live and work in the greater San Antonio area and continue to contribute to the area's economic and cultural life.



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COMMUNITY OUTREACH

UTSA's community outreach and collaborative enterprises assist in making San Antonio and South Texas a better place to live and work.

- The Office of Community Outreach works with community leaders to promote higher education as an economic development resource.

- UTSA P-20 Initiatives provides leadership in education reform and facilitates university involvement in public education through intervention programs, research and service.

- Legacy: Hands on the Past provides tours to children in grades K-12 at the Center for Archaeological Research labs.

- The Nonprofit Management Program offers leadership and management skills programs for nonprofit professionals, volunteers and board members.

- In 2008, UTSA's Institute of Texan Cultures welcomed 60,000 students to the exhibit floor and reached an additional 20,000 students, educators and citizens through off-site teacher training, hands-on presentations, community events and videoconferences.

Located at the Downtown Campus, the Institute for Economic Development provides consulting, training, technical, research and information services to new and established businesses. Comprising 10 programs serving three states (Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana) and the border region, the institute partners with federal, state and local government and businesses to foster economic and community development.



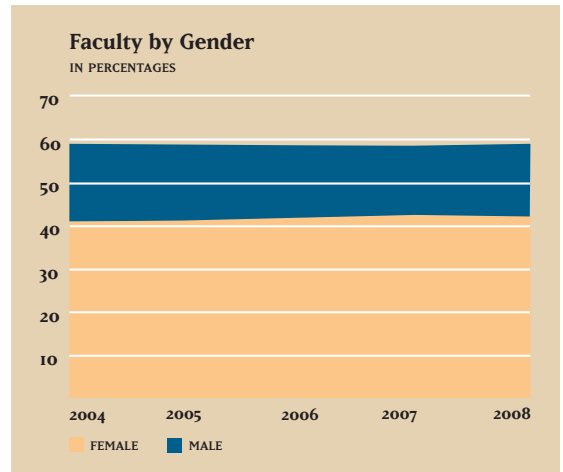
The Prefreshman Engineering Program (PREP), now in its 30th year, offers programs for high-achieving middle and high school students with the potential for becoming engineers and scientists.

FACULTY AND STAFF

UTSA prides itself on recruiting and retaining faculty members who are nationally and internationally recognized in their fields. More than 98 percent of full-time faculty hold doctoral or equivalent terminal degrees in their fields. UTSA's endowed professorships, a measure of academic excellence, include 12 distinguished chairs and five distinguished professorships. UTSA has 590 tenured and tenure-track faculty positions.

More than 5,100 faculty and staff members provide the academic, administrative, professional, clerical and technical support that sustains excellence in higher education as well as keeping UTSA's campuses running smoothly on a daily basis.

Ninety-eight percent of UTSA's full-time faculty hold doctorates or equivalent terminal degrees.

Research enriches academic life at the university, creating an atmosphere where discoveries are made and things are happening. Knowing that their professors are involved in work at the forefront of their fields encourages students to pursue careers and creates excitement for learning.



COSTS/FINANCIAL AID

Current tuition and fees for an in-state undergraduate student enrolled full time with 15 credit hours is \$3,550 per semester. The estimated cost for books and supplies runs about \$500 per semester.

The cost for on-campus housing is \$5,058 per year; meal plans average \$2,712 per year.

UTSA provides students with a range of need-based and non-need-based aid including grants, scholarships, loans and work-study jobs. Approximately 70 percent of UTSA students receive some type of financial aid. UTSA meets undergraduate and graduate student financial aid needs through grants, scholarships, loans and both federal and institutional work-study awards.

Like tuition, required fees are calculated on a per school hour cost. Both resident and nonresident undergraduates currently pay an average of \$1,150 in fees per semester for a 15-hour course load.

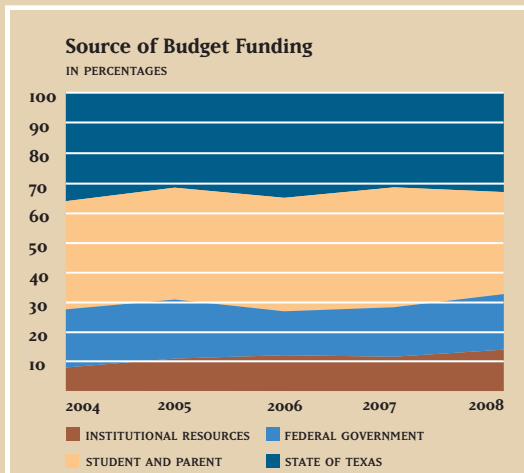

Situated on 18 acres in the historic Cattleman Square District, the Downtown Campus offers 650 undergraduate and graduate courses. During its first semester of operation in 1994, the campus was home to 909 students. Today, more than 6,400 students take classes at the Downtown Campus.



UTSA's Institute of Texan Cultures is San Antonio's cultural experience museum. The ITC's 50,000-square-foot exhibit floor showcases Texas culture, history, science and technology to students and the general public.



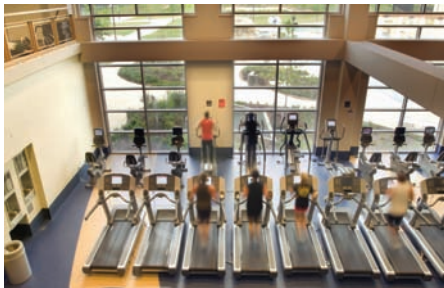

ATHLETICS

Go Roadrunners! UTSA is a member of the Southland Conference and is San Antonio's only NCAA Division I institution. The university fields teams in 16 sports, including baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, indoor and outdoor track and field, softball, tennis, soccer and volleyball. In 2007, students passed a referendum to increase their student fees to expand athletics programs with support for the eventual addition of a football program.

Each year, the university awards nearly \$2 million in athletic scholarships. There are more than 200 men and women competing in intercollegiate athletics for the university, most of whom will go on to live and work in the San Antonio community.



UTSA's Recreation and Wellness Center, a popular student destination, includes a 54-foot climbing wall as well as numerous sport courts, fitness studios, weight rooms, a demonstration kitchen and the latest in work-out equipment. The center recently completed a \$45 million expansion.

UTSA's athletics teams have qualified for 36 NCAA championship events:

- Baseball regional in 1994 and 2005
- Men's indoor track and field championships in 2004 and 2005
- Men's basketball first round in 1988, 1999 and 2004
- Women's indoor track and field championships in 1988, 1989, 1990, 1996, 1997, 1998 and 2006
- Women's basketball first round in 2008
- Men's outdoor track and field championships in 1995, 1996, 1997, 2002, 2004, 2007 and 2008
- Women's cross country championships in 1996
- Women's outdoor track and field championships in 1985, 1989, 1992, 2002, 2004, 2005 and 2007
- Softball regional in 2004 and 2006
- Volleyball first round in 2000
- Men's tennis regional in 2002
- Women's tennis regional in 2002



The 2008 UTSA women's basketball team advanced to the first round of the NCAA Tournament in March, making it the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance.

In 1988, UTSA men's basketball earned its first trip to March Madness, accomplishing the feat again in 1999 and in 2004. UTSA hosted the 2008 NCAA Men's Final Four and will host the 2010 Women's Final Four basketball championships.



ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

UTSA's Alumni Association

- supports the educational activities and aspirations of the university
- promotes policies favorable to higher education
- engages in numerous benevolent and charitable undertakings relevant to the mission of UTSA.

Alumni lend their varied expertise to university advisory councils, helping to develop centers of excellence. They work tirelessly in the community and with corporate leaders to promote UTSA's role in the educational and economic development of South Texas. Since 1982, the Alumni Association has awarded more than \$721,300 in scholarships to 548 deserving students. UTSA has 76,000 alumni, many of whom stay in the San Antonio area after graduation.

The goal of the Alumni Association is to distribute at least \$60,000 in scholarships annually to UTSA students. In 2008-2009, the association will award \$74,000 in scholarships, thereby making the goal of a college degree attainable for many deserving students.

ADVANCEMENT AT UTSA

Increasing the level of private philanthropic support is a crucial component of building a premier public research university. Contributions to UTSA provide scholarships, faculty support, academic programming and a source of flexible funds. Gift opportunities exist throughout the University, including membership in the President's Associates, donations to the Annual Fund, gifts to specific colleges and deferred giving.

Endowed chairs and professorships are important in helping recruit outstanding faculty, while endowed scholarships help attract bright and talented students to academic programs at UTSA. Building the University's endowment is an institutional priority, and UTSA now has 281 endowments with a combined market value of more than \$54 million.
