Generally, they receive significantly less training than sworn officers or full-time employees. However if the agency chooses to involve them in various activities to assist in the day-to-day delivery of law enforcement services, it should ensure that their duties do not require the status of a sworn officer, their level of training is adjusted according to the scope of their authority, and that unauthorized weapons or equipment are not carried in the performance of their duties.
