Chair's Report Dr. Karen Daas

- HOP 2.27 (online and hybrid courses) has been tabled and sent back for a re-write. The revised version will likely be resubmitted to the Senate in the spring of 2016. This policy was meant to be a first step in the conversations around online and hybrid courses.

Provost's Report Dr. John Frederick

- New plans for the summer term are underway. The summer application process will be easier for non-degree seeking students and a new financial model should be finalized withing the next few weeks (a white paper has been distributed to chairs)
- A tuition and fee proposal committee
 has been formed. Currently the UT
 system allows for a 2% increase to
 offset inflation, and any higher
 increase must be justified. The
 committee is working on
 recommendations and funds have
 been budgeted to allow for merit
 exercises going forward.
- "First generation" faculty members are invited to participate in a new program called Pivot, which encourages these faculty to mentor first generation students.
- A research plan is being developed (system-wide) that will standardize the way workload is recorded among all colleges. Overall, UTSA had a very successful audit.

Campus Carry Update

The deadline for the Campus Carry Task Force to provide input to Dr. Romo on campus carry has been extended to the middle of November. If you have not yet done so, please visit www.utsa.edu/campuscarry or email campuscarry@utsa.edu to provide input.

The Senate has designated a Campus Carry Special Committee comprised of Senators and Non-Senators from across the university. The committee was tasked with drafting a statement to Dr. Romo on behalf of the Faculty Senate. This resolution urges the President to consider additional spaces as gun-free zones, especially classrooms, offices, labs, practice rooms, and studios. This committee also seeks to survey the student body to garner a sense of student opinion on the topic. These suggestions will all go forward to Dr. Romo.

Other Items:

 The Curriculum Committee had been working on a policy proposal for certificate approval; however, since the graduate school already has a policy in place that is closely aligned to the policy in development, the committee recommended approval of their proposal.

The Faculty Senate is an elected legislative and deliberative body whose primary purpose is to represent the UTSA faculty. The Faculty Senate reviews and formulates policy and enacts legislation on all matters pertaining to the professional concerns, duties, standards, ethics, responsibilities, prerequisites, and work conditions of the UTSA faculty, as well as matters relating to academic freedom and equity for the faculty. The Faculty Senate acts to amend or approve changes to the Handbook of Operating Procedures.
