- UTSA/SSA Update: Much progress has been made in merger of the Southwest School of Art (SSA) with UTSA, as noted in the recent email <u>update</u>. Kudos to COLFA and AAH colleagues <u>who have worked hard to move forward on this exciting opportunity</u>.

## Fulbright Programs Report AMIRAH NELSON, SENIOR OUTREACH OFFICER, FULBRIGHT SPECIALIST PROGRAM

- The Fulbright Program is a program of the U.S. Department of State with funding provided by the U.S. Government. It is led by the United States government in partnership with more than 160 countries worldwide, the Fulbright Program offers international educational and cultural exchange programs for students, scholars, artists, teachers, and professionals of all backgrounds to study, teach, or pursue important research and professional projects. Learn more the various opportunities at eca.state.gov/fulbright
  - **Specialist program** offers 2-6 week project-based exchanges at a range of institutions across the globe. Over 150 eligible countries and typically 400+ projects are available annually with no out-of-pocket costs for participants. Costs are covered by hosting institutions and the Department of State. Opportunities are available in 24 disciplines and numerous specializations. Eligible host institutions include institutions of higher education, government institutions, cultural institutions, non-governmental organizations and medical institutions.   - Additional opportunities for U.S. scholars and administrators (view catalog)
    - Fulbright U.S. Scholar Awards include opportunities for professionals, artists and scholars at all career-levels to teach, research and conduct professional projects.
    - **Fulbright Postdoctoral Awards (OLF)** provide recently graduated scholars (within 5 years of doctoral degree) with opportunities to conduct research and receive professional training abroad.
    - Fulbright International Education Administrator Awards enable international education professionals and senior higher education officials an opportunity to engage in a two-week intensive seminar to learn about a host country's education system and establish international networks
  - Bringing Foreign Fulbrighters to UTSA

    - Fulbright Scholar in Residence Program: Host scholars from other countries to teach for a semester or an academic year. Fulbright Outreach Lecturing Fund: Host current Fulbright Visiting Scholars for short-term lectureships of 2-6 days on discipline or cultural topics to internationalize the campus.
    - Fulbright Language Teaching Assistant Program: Host native speaking language teaching assistants to enhance students' understanding of different languages and cultures.

# DREW JOHNSON: CHAIR AFEM/DEPT. OF CIVIL AND ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERING

### **Committee Report:** 2 Documents up for vote today

- Memorandum for Written Comments in Teaching Evaluations
  - Charge: to provide input on proposed changes in teaching evaluations that written comments provided to faculty be made available to department chairs and deans
  - Recommendations:
    - student comments should not be shared with those responsible for the formal evaluation of faculty job performance
    - comments could be securely archived in university offices that have the mission to improve the teaching and learning environments
    - the university Handbook of Operating Procedures (HOP) should be revised
    - inform students of the ways in which their comments are utilized
  - Discussion:
    - there were concerns that the statement did not address student evaluation bias
    - the question was raised whether, if students comments are not forwarded, there was any other way for students to give feedback on the teaching experience?
    - a Department Chairs Council member shared that this discussion had been raised at the DCC meeting as well and that students are shocked to learn that their comments aren't forwarded, both from a positive and negative perspective
    - there was concern that the recommendations could result in the submission of only negative comments to the chairs, the point was made that as supervisors there is a desire to take care of both faculty and student success and so it is important to weigh anomalous negative comments with positive comments to get the full picture
    - in agreement with recommendation #3, there was discussion that providing a clear process was imperative.
    - The FS Chair reminded the Senate that this was just the first step in the process that, SVP Heather Shipley asked the committee to consider this. They have, and these recommendations will now will go back to her for her response, so this is not the final say.
    - clarification on the result of the vote was requested and it was clarified that the vote would be to proceed in sending the
      recommendations to SVP Shipley who would in turn meet with AFEM to discuss implementation that would then be reported
      back to the Senate for vote on whether there is agreement or not on the plan to move forward
    - concern was expressed that there is documentation that faculty of color, faculty who teach from a critical race paradigm, gender and sexuality studies, etc. receive primarily negative evaluations no matter the strength or quality of the faculty member
  - Voting opened and the motion to send the AFEM recommendations to SVP Shipley passed
- Statement on Academic Freedom
  - Charge: to provide a written statement on academic freedom
  - Recommendation:
    - the AFEM established that the audience for the statement was the UTSA community (faculty/staff/students)
    - incorporated into the selected wording are the mission of UTSA as a Hispanic Serving Institution, the importance of academic freedom to teach the content we think needs to be taught without influence from external sources outside the areas of expertise, and why tenure is necessary to protect that academic freedom.
    - it recognizes that there are faculty who are feeling political pressure in teaching their areas of expertise in social justice, race, ethnicity and gender issues and as a faculty body, we stand with them.
  - Discussion:

- there were multiple discussions over the language used in the statement, which some felt did not address CRT and racial and gender equity, specifically.
- concern was expressed that the statement seemed to only address tenured faculty and not the right of all educators to teach from any perspective.
- a suggestion was made to tighten the resolution verbiage to respond more forcefully to the interim charges of the Lt. Governor.
- a question was asked about the options available to pass this document
- the FS Chair reminded the Senate that procedure dictates the vote be on the document as presented in its current form. The statement could only be amended at this time, if the person who presented the document expressed willingness to allow friendly amendments. If the motion to move forward with the document in its current form fails in the vote, then an immediate motion could be brought forward to revise the document. He advised that all senators unhappy with the current form of the document should disapprove of the motion to initiate the process of revising or creating a a new document.
- The AFEM chair was asked to summarize the committee's decision to not use the term CRT in the statement. The AFEM chair stated that this was a document of many compromises to get to the current draft and discussion included the definition of CRT and the context for its use. The intent of the verbiage was to be more inclusive to address the issues at hand rather than to use any particular phrasing.

- a question of procedure regarding the possibility of tabling the discussion was raised and the FS chair explained the process for that action: if the motion is tabled, it will move to discussion at the next exec session (4/21) to determine next steps. If this action is followed it would be unlikely that a statement could be finalized this semester.
- there was support for the Senate discussion to be a safe space for all faculty to voice their feedback
- the point was made that this should not be viewed as the only time the Senate can speak out on this ongoing issue.
- the FS chair explained that if the motion is tabled, it will come up again at the next meeting in its exact form but while it is being tabled, new motions can be recognized for a different way to proceed
- the question was asked as to the quickest, simplest most inclusive way to get a strong resolution that properly supports the people who are most vulnerable with another asking if a motion could be made to edit/revise the statement while the motion is tabled to which the FA chair confirmed that motion could be made.
- A motion was raised to table the motion and a second was given, superseding the previous motion. APPROVED
- A motion was made and a second was given to create an ad hoc committee with the members indicated below and charged with revising the document to be reflective of the conversation in this meeting for presentation to the Senate in May. APPROVED

## **New Business**

- Rica Ramirez: COEHD has been tasked to look at P&T and annual review. There is a guestion about 4th year review and whether it is included in the HOP or whether the Faculty Senate was involved in discussions for this practice - the FS Chair offered to take this question to SVP Heather Shipley to get more information.
- Candace Christensen: Asked if anyone knows if UTSA has reached out to the American Indians in Texas at the Spanish Colonial Missions about a land acknowledgement? Sonya Aleman provided a lead by reporting that she believes a member of the La Raza Faculty Association worked on a committee under the Office of Inclusive Excellence to draft a land acknowledgment over the past year.
- **Becky Huang:** Brought to everyone's attention that the university is considering doing catalog revisions for both undergraduate and graduate catalog in the same year and so is proposing to do all changes again next year and then to switch to revisions every two years. The Grad Council Chair voiced that the Council is mostly against the change and that further discussions are ongoing.
