Re: Review of proposal for the Certificate in Legal Studies for undergraduate students in

University College Date: April 18, 2019

University College and Dean's Council have reviewed and supported the proposal.

Faculty senate curriculum committee reviewed the proposal for the *Certificate in Legal Studies* from the University College. **Based on our evaluation, we recommend the proposal to be approved by the faculty senate**. Yes: 3, No: 0, Abstain: 0, No response: 3.

Please see below for the summary of our evaluation.

- The **objectives** of the program are to
  - (1) provide students with substantive skills to improve their analytical reasoning and logic, critical reading and thinking, and writing and research skills in preparations for law school;
  - o (2) introduce students to law school and the legal profession; and
  - o (3) facilitate exposure to the law to strengthen their desire to attend law school and have first-hand experience in the legal field.
- The certificate offers courses that help students develop ABA recommended skills and joins students' academic coursework with experiential learning opportunities that may count towards the student's major, minor, or elective credits.

The requirements for the Certificate in Legal Studies for undergraduate students include:

Any undergraduate student from UTSA can apply the *Certificate in Legal Studies* and get the certificate. Students must complete a minimum of 15 semester credit hours at the upper division level for certificate completion. All courses may be completed in diverse colleges during fall or spring semesters or within the Summer Law School Preparation Academy (SLSPA).

Students must take the following core courses (9 credit hours):

- PHI 2043 Introductory Logic
- WRC 3013 Writing Strategies for the Prelaw Student

(or PAL 3013 Legal Research and Writing and)

• UCS 4933 Internship in Prelaw Studies

(or PAL and POL 4933 Internship)

Students must choose 2 elective courses (6 credit hours) offering skill development in ABA suggested prelaw skills. The full list of elective courses is attached.

# **Other Requirements**

Students must earn a C- or better in each course and achieve at least 2.5 GPA in all courses to satisfy the requirements of the certificate.

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## **Reason for Request**

- The Certificate in Legal Studies complements and strengthens UTSA's position as a top feeder for law schools, helping students to become more competitive to be admitted into top rank law schools.
- The Certificate in Legal Studies will place UTSA within a strong group of universities
  that offer prelaw certificates helping students develop skills and professional learning
  experiences needed in law school.

# **Relationship to Existing Programs**

- UTSA has the following related programs: Politics and Law (PAL), Political Science (POL), Criminal Justice (CRJ), Summer Law School Preparation Academy (SLSPA).
- The Prelaw Studies Certificate complements rather than competes with PAL, POL, CRJ, and SLSPA.
- The Prelaw Studies Certificate will benefit students who already earn credits for major or minor within their respective colleges. Additionally, the certificate is open to all undergraduate students, regardless of major or minor, as these courses may be taken as electives.

- UCS 4933 Internship in Prelaw Studies will be a new course that will provide experiential learning in a legal environment, and
- UCS 4913 Independent Study in Prelaw will be created to allow students to do a prelaw research project. Can be taken as one of the two electives for the Certification.
- No additional resources are needed for this certificate. For completion of the certificate, other courses are already taught across disciplines and Colleges within the University. Classrooms, and technologies will support program delivery.

**UCS 4933 Internship in Prelaw Studies** will be designed to serve as a pre-professional experience for students who may want to attend law school. The internship will provide students a learning experience at a law firm, in a legal department of a corporation, government agency, or nonprofit legal organization. The internship course will be under the direction of a faculty member of University College.

---Elective---

**UCS 4913 Independent Study in Prelaw** will be designed for students to hone the skills needed for law school in case they decide to pursue a legal education. Students must do independent reading, research, discussion, and/or writing on a prelaw topic under the direction of a faculty member of University College.
