What is Title IX? Title IX is the law that prohibits discrimination based on sex/gender in every education program that receives federal funding. Title IX incidents include many types of behaviors, such as gender discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual violence, intimate partner violence and dating/domestic violence, sexual misconduct, and stalking.

University Commitment: The University of Texas at San Antonio is committed to provide an educational and working environment that is free from discrimination and misconduct based on sex/gender, including discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression. The University will conduct a prompt, fair, and impartial investigation and, where appropriate, issue remedial measures and/or sanctions.

Emergency Resources:

It is helpful to report as soon as you are able, and to preserve evidence, in case you wish to pursue a criminal, civil, or university investigation. Evidence can include physical evidence through a forensic medical exam, clothing, pictures, texts, and social media communications.

LAW ENFORCEMENT



University Police Department (UTSA PD): Individuals may report an incident, with or without filing charges. Call 911 for emergencies. 210-458-4911. Use the UTSA **LiveSafe app** which allows students, faculty, staff and visitors to: Report Suspicious Activity, UTSA Safety Resources, Report Incidents, Emergency Options, and Safewalk. To Download "LiveSafe" from Google Play or the App Store. Register with your phone number, Select "The University of Texas at San Antonio" as your school.

San Antonio Police Department (SAPD): If the incident is occurring (occurred) in San Antonio, but off-campus, a report may be filed with SAPD. Call 911 for emergencies. To report non-emergency situations please call at **210-207-7273**.



MEDICAL ATTENTION

Methodist Specialty and Transplant Hospital : Provides confidential medical care, such as STI and pregnancy testing, x-rays, medical exams, provides a private space for forensic medical exams by a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE), and provides patient education to students. 210-575-8110.

Reporting Resources:

Report incidents of sex discrimination, sexual assault, interpersonal violence, stalking, and sexual misconduct. Submitting a complaint or report to the EOS/Title IX Office, does not require you to pursue a complete investigation in order to obtain supportive measures. We can assist in many ways including obtaining a no-contact orders, making classroom or housing adjustments, and accessing on-and-off campus resources.

Services below are considered non-mandatory reporting options. These resources are not required to report to the University. There are limits to their privacy, and it is not protected under law.



UTSA Peace Center: Is a safe, confidential setting for students to share disclosure of incidents related to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and hate crimes; to discuss their rights and obtain information on reporting options; to receive assistance with decision making processes and supportive services. Supportive services are victim-centric, trauma informed and holistic. Advocates provide crisis intervention, safety planning, needs assessment, case management, referrals as appropriate and resources as needed. Advocates may provide coordination of campus support services to comprehensively address the survivor's immediate needs as well as their longer term needs, in an effort minimize risk factors leading to academic failure. utsa.edu/peacecenter/
