NEW 4116 | Albums and Photobooks

Keri Miki-Lani Schroeder | All Levels

Learn to make unique albums and photobooks using archival materials and bookbinding techniques. An expandable album for mounting photos will be covered as well as a stacked folio book which allows for uninterrupted printing across page spreads. Bring in your own 4 x 6-inch photos to include in your photo book. *Includes some materials*, see website for a list of items needed for class.

NEW 4107 | <u>Traditional Japanese</u> Book <u>Binding: Yotsume Toji</u>

Learn to stitch a four-hole stab binding, yotsume toji, along with other binding variations (tortoise shell, hemp leaf and kangzi) using traditional Japanese tools and Japanese paper. Discussion about the history of papermaking in Japan including the hand printed papers of Chiyogami and Katazomi-shi. Students will experience first-hand the traditional way to back paper or cloth for the cover, learn traditional folding techniques for the inner binding threads or kayori, and how to fold the pages with a bamboo folder.

Students are encouraged to bring ideas for their own projects, whether a poster, cards, art print or book pages. This course requires some preparation outside of class to complete projects during open studio hours. Supplies and tools needed for individual projects will be discussed in class.

Learn the basic elements, or tools, used to create the human figure in an academic procedural approach; that is, a general-to-specific approach, where one element is built upon a previous one (as opposed to a more direct type of drawing where each line is essentially the finished line). Students will explore how to draw the gesture clearly and learn to contain the forms that make up the human body into basic volumes (i.e. spheres, boxes, ellipses and cylinders). Towards the end of the course, students will concentrate on specific landmarks of anatomy and useful facts about the human body, in order to develop a strong systematic approach that frees them creatively, while adding complexity and a new level of believability to their drawings. Students will work from live models and use simple drawing materials. Prerequisite: Previous drawing experience. Model fees are included; please see website for a list of supplies.

This class will focus on the basic skills of wheel throwing—centering, opening, and pulling clay into shape—followed by learning to form bowls, cylinders, and cups. Students will also learn to evaluate form and how form serves a vessel's function. **NOTE:** Sections SP1, SP2, and SP3 will work in mid-range clay and oxidation glazes. Section SP4 will work in low-fire clay and glazes. Class tuition includes one 25lb bag of clay per student; see *CERAMICS NOTE.

Lisa Nigro | Beginner

Fundamental handbuilding skills and techniques will be covered including pinch pots, coil building, and slab construction with a focus on fun, artful, and utilitarian forms as well as surface techniques to add decorative elements to make the work truly one-of-a-kind. The class will work in low-fire terracotta clay and glazes; students will learn how to use these materials for the purpose of handbuilding. See *CERAMICS NOTE.

1063 | Majolica Glazing Techniques

Maria Gould | Beginner/Intermediate

Majolica was first introduced to Italy during the 16th century and was heavily influenced by Hispano-Moresque decorated wares of Muslim Spain. Today, Majolica refers to a white, opaque tin-based glaze, composed of frits and tin oxide. Through demonstrations and lectures, students will be introduced to both traditional and nontraditional methods of glaze applications and construction techniques. Handbuilding techniques will be demonstrated and presented; those experienced in wheel throwing can work independently to create pottery forms but will not be demonstrated in class. The pieces will be fired at low temperature in electric kilns using a red earthenware clay body. Prerequisite: Students must have completed one handbuilding class or one wheelthrowing class. Class tuition includes one 25lb bag of clay per student; see *CERAMICS NOTE.

1066 | Maquettes for Sculpture

Marc Rosenthal | Beginner/Intermediate

This handbuilding class will focus on the skills for making maquettes (or small models) of ideas and concepts as reference to make larger future sculptures. Students will practice with gestures first, then make small models of their ideas. A variety of forming methods will be discussed and demonstrated. Work will be fired at low temperature in the electric kiln. **Prerequisite:** Students should have had one introductory handbuilding or wheelthrowing courses. Class tuition includes one 25lb bag of clay per student; see *CERAMICS NOTE.

1048 | Glazing Techniques

Michael Corney | Intermediate/Advanced

Glazing takes more time and consideration than you think! This class will focus on a form's glazed surface and the many application techniques that may be used—from wax resist, glaze spraying applications, to layering of glazes. Experimentation and persistence in glazing will be the goal of this class allowing an understanding of how cone 10 glazes work in the high-fire gas kiln. Work from a series of small handbuilt or thrown forms and progress to larger forms as you experiment. The instructor will work with each student to assist in fruition of their personal ideas. Prerequisite: Students must have completed at least two beginning level wheelthrowing or handbuilding classes. Class tuition includes one 25lb bag of clay per student; see *CERAMICS NOTE.

1040 | Mixed Media Sculpture

In this class, students create ceramic sculptural work that will incorporate the use of other non-ceramic materials and media to enhance the content and visual aesthetics of their work. Work will be low-fired and glazed or cold finished to achieve brighter colors and alternate surfaces. Students may need to purchase their own underglazes, glazes, or alternative finish materials. 

REGISTRATION GUIDELINES & POLICIES

Guidelines & Policies

- Adult classes are open to students ages 18 and above unless otherwise noted.
- Youth programs are open to students K-12.
- Classes are taught at UTSA-Southwest Campus at 300 Augusta or 1201 Navarro unless otherwise noted.
- Open studio for students enrolled in adult classes may be available; open studio varies by area, class and room availability. Please check with your instructor.
- Please follow safety protocols specific to each studio/classroom space.
- Students are asked to respect everyone's personal space; keep a safe distance from peers and instructors. Masks are suggested for personal protection
- Students are also asked to be courteous and respectful to others, personal property, and that of the studios and campus.
- Inappropriate or disruptive behavior such as the use of profanity, harassment, or sexual innuendo, dominating an instructor or student's time, or misuse or dominating the use of equipment or shared class materials is unacceptable. Such behavior may be considered grounds for dismissal from class.
- Visitors, children, or non-registered students are only permitted in class with the advanced, expressed permission of the class instructor and/or the department chair. They are not permitted during open studio hours.

Cancellations, Refunds, Withdrawals & Transfers

- UTSA reserve the right to cancel, combine, reschedule classes, or change class instructors when necessary.
- If UTSA cancels a class for any reason, all registered students will be informed as soon as possible and will be given the opportunity to transfer to another class with no transfer fee applied. Tuition will be refunded 100% for cancelled classes.
- A \$45 withdrawal fee and a \$25 transfer fee will be charged per class for changes made by students.
- Notice of withdrawal by a student must be made in writing and received no later than 5 business days prior to the first day
 of class.
- Notice of withdrawal for Special Classes must be made two weeks prior to the class start date.
- No refunds will be made for withdrawals made after those times.
- Failure to attend classes or verbal notification will not be regarded as an official notice of withdrawal.

Parking

- Parking permits will be distributed the first 2 weeks of class. Passes should be clearly displayed.
- Parking is on a first come, first-serve basis and available at any unmarked space during the hours of 8:00am-4:30pm; park up available after 4:30P. See UTSA website for *parking locations*. Additional parking is available at the Central Library, self-pay lots or on the street nearby.
- Accessible parking spaces are in both the main lot and at the Santikos lot. Guest parking in ADA accessible spaces do require proper plate or placard. Loading zones are limited to 10 minutes.
- Parking permits may not be duplicated or shared with non-students and are not intended for non-school business parking.
