Tuition-Based Art Studios



Youth Art classes are a wonderful opportunity for young artists to get direct instruction from one of our highly qualified teaching artists. These tuition-based classes are offered in a variety of media for ages 5-18. They vary in length from 4-8 sessions. Tuition includes all materials and supplies, unless otherwise specified.

Students will create process-oriented art works throughout the week as they delve into artistic techniques, explore different media, and learn about art history and current trends in contemporary art. Classes take place on UT San Antonio's Southwest Campus at 300 Augusta Street; instructors meet students outside the Urschel Administrative Building before leading them to their class location.

Class enrollment is limited to 10-12 students per class, guaranteeing quality one-on-one instruction and allows the teaching artists to get to know students, their goals, and develop exceptional works of art. SATURDAY MORNING DISCOVERY (SMD)



Saturday Morning Discovery (SMD) is a free, introductory art experience designed for children ages 5 – 14 and their parent or guardian. This program provides family fun and collaborative learning by awakening a passion for art. During this exploratory learning participants have a hands-on opportunity to work one-on-one with artist-teachers in a wide variety of media, including pin hole photography, clay, drawing, painting, origami, weaving, printmaking, sessional crafts, and more.

Families can sign up for one session per school year. Parents or guardians work alongside their child during the activities and must remain with their child/children at all times. Classes take place on the UT San Antonio Southwest Campus.

Spring Sessions run January through April on Saturdays from 9:30am – 11:30am. Each session meets over four consecutive Saturdays, unless stated otherwise.

The program is free, but advance registration is required for each participant, including parents and guardians.



4001 | Introduction to Papermaking

Lacey Mills | All Levels

Get your feet wet in this introductory class and explore what handmade paper is all about. Students will have the opportunity to learn about the papermaking process from breaking down fibers to creating paper pulp, adding color to the paper pulp, and using stencils and vails to create paper samples to take home. Includes all materials. NOTE: Papermaking is a wet process; please dress accordingly, closed-toed & non-slip shoes should be worn. Water-proof aprons are available. Includes materials; please bring a bag lunch.

4070 | Flax Paper

Jo Etta Jupe | All Levels

Flax is the plant fiber that produces linen and linseed oil. In papermaking, flax provides a sustainable source of pulp fiber and produces paper of superior strength. This class will introduce the basics of using flax to make handmade paper including the process of taking flax from fiber form to paper pulp. Students will work with pre-beaten pulp to shape a bowl or vessel form with inclusions of collage papers, stencils, pulp paint, and string. A discussion on other structures and options will provide insight into other possibilities. NOTE: Papermaking is a wet process; please dress accordingly, closed-toed & non-slip shoes should be worn. Water-proof aprons are available. Includes materials; please bring a bag lunch.

4107 | Traditional Japanese Book Binding: Yotsume Toji

Lindsay Nakashima | All Levels

Learn to stitch a four-hole stab binding, yotsume toji, along with other binding variations (tortoise shell, hemp leaf and kangzi) using traditional Japanese tools and Japanese paper. Discussion about the history of papermaking in Japan including the hand printed papers of Chiyogami and Katazomi-shi. Students will experience first-hand the traditional way to back paper or cloth for the cover, learn traditional folding techniques for the inner binding threads or kayori, and how to fold the pouch-like pages.

6111 | Printmaking

Explore non-toxic printmaking methods with focus on areas of greatest individual interest. Class instruction will include producing the plate or matrix, printing, and editioning. Beginner-level students will try various types of printmaking—relief, monotype, collagraph, and etching. Intermediate students will have the opportunity to explore more advanced projects in etching, relief, and collagraph. *A materials list will be provided at the first class*.

Up your correspondence game—make your own unique cards just in time for Valentine's. Discover the basics of letterpress printing and get hands-on experience in this two-day workshop. Learn to set wood and metal type, as well as printer's cuts with images and print on a cylinder press. Students will design their own card, print take-home pieces for themselves, and contribute to a collaborative card swap. *Includes materials*; please bring a bag lunch.

6148 | Relief Printmaking Workshop

This course will introduce students to the graphic aspect of relief printing with linoleum block. This technique is ideal for printing in a home studio without a press. Learn how to translate an image to a block, carve images by hand using traditional carving tools, apply water-based ink with rollers, and print by hand. Examples of relief prints will also be shown as well as methods for print registration, proofing, and editioning. Includes some materials; see website for supplies list—please bring images or source materials for inspiration and a bag lunch.

6308 | Letterpress Skills

Michael Simons | All Levels

Letterpress printing is a great method for creating artwork editions that incorporate text as well as images using the studio's collection of vintage wood and metal type or newly made polymer plates. Letterpress can be used for creating posters, art prints, handbills, book pages, or personalized cards. Learn basic techniques for letterpress printing with hands-on instructions on layout design and typesetting, inking and impression, as well as setting up and cleaning the press. Students are encouraged to bring ideas for their own projects. This course requires some preparation outside of class during open studio hours to complete projects. Supplies and tools needed for individual projects will be discussed in class.

In this class you will be guided in use of the coiling method to build your own asymmetrical vessels of various sizes. Over the two days you will be learning how to use both the wet and leather hard states of clay to hone your shapes and explore surface area. Underglazes will be explored in class. *Please bring a bag lunch*.

1040 | Raku and Other Alternative Firing Techniquesk

Lyn Woods | Intermediate/Advanced

Open to individuals who throw and/or hand-build, this class will focus on three methods of low temperature alternative firing—American raku, horsehair resist with high contrast, and vapor fuming in a barrel kiln. Burnishing, the making and use of terra sigillata, using oxides as colorants, and copper wire for mark making will be covered with a focus on understanding appropriate forms for the different firing techniques and some of the various types of resists. 

- Open studio for students enrolled in adult classes may be available; open studio varies by area, class and room availability. Please check with your instructor.
- Please follow safety protocols specific to each studio/classroom space.
- Students are asked to respect everyone's personal space; keep a safe distance from peers and instructors. Masks are suggested for personal protection
- Students are also asked to be courteous and respectful to others, personal property, and that of the studios and campus.
- Inappropriate or disruptive behavior such as the use of profanity, harassment, or sexual innuendo, dominating an instructor or student's time, or misuse or dominating the use of equipment or shared class materials is unacceptable. Such behavior may be considered grounds for dismissal from class.
- Visitors, children, or non-registered students are only permitted in class with the advanced, expressed permission of the class instructor and/or the department chair. They are not permitted during open studio hours.

Cancellations, Refunds, Withdrawals & Transfers

- UTSA reserve the right to cancel, combine, reschedule classes, or change class instructors when necessary.
- If UTSA cancels a class for any reason, all registered students will be informed as soon as possible and will be given the opportunity to transfer to another class with no transfer fee applied. Tuition will be refunded 100% for cancelled classes.
- A \$50 withdrawal fee and a \$25 transfer fee will be charged per class for changes made by students.
- Notice of withdrawal by a student must be made by emailing communityart@utsa.edu no later than 7 business days prior to the first day of class.
- Notice of withdrawal for Special Classes must be made two weeks prior to the class start date.
- No refunds will be made for withdrawals made after those times.
- Failure to attend classes or verbal notification will not be regarded as an official notice of withdrawal.

Parking

- Parking at the UTSA SW Campus requires a Dashboard Parking Permit Monday, 7:00am Friday, 4:30pm
- Parking at SW Campus (Lots 1, 3, 4 & 5) is on a first-come, first-serve basis and is not guaranteed for Community Art students. Street parking and several pay lots and garages are located nearby.
- Community Art students will receive a Dashboard Parking Permit for the SW Campus during their first night of class.
- Dashboard Parking Permits may not be duplicated or shared with non-student and are not intended for non-school business parking.
- Dashboard Parking Permits are for unmarked commuter spaces Monday-Friday 7:00am 4:30pm. Employee B spaces maybe be used Monday Thursday after 4:30pm and Friday, 4:30pm through Sunday evening. All other marked spaces are reserved for other permit types.
