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Academic Freedom

Academic freedom lies at the heart of free, independent, critical inquiry that is fundamental to the university's mission.

1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom & Tenure

- Academic freedom for teachers in teaching, research and expression
- Jointly issued by American Association of University Professors (AAUP) and what is now American Association of Colleges & University (AAC&U)
- UT San Antonio and 900+ others are AAC&U members
- Adopted in UT System policies

Academic freedom safeguards include tenure, due process, shared governance

1940 AAUP/AAC&U Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom & Tenure

Academic Freedom of Faculty Members consists of four interrelated elements:

- freedom to discuss all relevant matters in the classroom **
- freedom to explore all avenues of scholarship, research, and creative expression and to publish the results of such work
- freedom from institutional censorship or discipline when speaking or writing as participants in the governance of an educational institution
- freedom from institutional censorship when speaking or writing as citizen
- ** Applies to anyone employed in a teaching role in higher education.

Tenure

1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom & Tenure

Tenure is a means to certain ends; specifically:

(1) freedom of teaching and research and of extramural activities, and

(2) a sufficient degree of economic security to make the profession attractive to all people of ability.

Freedom and economic security, hence, tenure, are indispensable to the success of an institution in fulfilling its obligations to its students and to society.

Shared Governance Principles

1966 Statement on Government of Colleges and Universities

- Jointly formulated by AAUP, ACE and AGB
- UT San Antonio is a member of American Council on Education (ACE)
- UT System is a member of the Association of Governing Boards of Universities & Colleges (AGB)
- Describes roles for Faculty, President, and Governing Board

"This statement is a call to mutual understanding regarding the government of colleges and universities." (emphasis added)
